

Upcoming Coastal Resources Commission Meeting

Oceanfront setbacks / Beach Management Plans

• Final draft rule and fiscal analysis – seeking approval to send to public hearing

Inlet Hazard Areas

- Seeking fiscal analysis approval
- Public hearings would be held in each oceanfront county
- DOT update on Ocracoke / South Dock Ferry Terminal
- Parking fees at CAMA Beach Access sites
 - Can "only be used for operation, maintenance, and enhancement of public access, or the provision of new access"
 - Reports on expenditures required by existing CRC rule
 - Seeking guidance from Commission

Changes to Sediment Criteria

CRC Sediment Criteria 15A NCAC 7H .0312

- Ensures sand used for beach fill matches sand on recipient beach
- 2020 Amendments allow greater flexibility for sampling borrow sites
 - Improve characterization of recipient beach, w/ focus on large material (rocks and shell)
- Requires surveys of 10,000 sf plots centered on each transect (5,000' spacing between transects)
 - Count shell > 3 in. diameter
 - Count sediment > 1 in. diameter
- One-time requirement data will be available on DCM website

Upcoming Beach Surveys

Grants to local governments to meet new requirements

- January 2021 DCM announced large sediment sampling funding opportunity
 - No match requirement
- 13 applications requesting \$171,390
- Grants range from \$6,000 \$35,000
- 10 local govts are currently under contract

RCCP Vision


