- Public safety and health
  - Navigation
  - Injury
  - Contamination
- Economic
  - Removal costs-public funding
  - Tourism
  - Recreation

# Emergency Support Function No. 10 (ESF-10) Oil and Hazardous Materials Response

- Unified Command (USCG, NCWRC, NCDEQ-DCM)
- Flagged 383 vessels requiring assessment for hazardous materials response
- Beaufort, Craven, Hyde, Pamlico 197 vessels,
   79 ESF 10 action
- Bladen, Brunswick, Carteret, New Hanover,
   Onslow Pender 165 vessels, 41 ESF 10 action
- Does not provide for wreck removal or vessel disposal
- ESF-3: Public Works and Critical Transportation
   North Carolina not eligible due to current rules





#### **ADV Authority**

2015, G.S. 153A-132: Local governments may adopt ordinances to manage and remove vessels, amended in 2018 to include all 20 coastal counties

Session Law 2019-224 and 2020-74: NCWRC receives emergency authority and funding from the N.C. General Assembly to contact owners and remove vessels


Session Law 2023-27: Authority for cities and towns to develop and adopt ordinances to remove and dispose of abandoned vessels







# **Putting the Pieces Together**





#### **ADV Removal Process**


- Original Database- USCG Hurricane Florence
  - Collaboration between NCWRC, DCM, NCCF
  - Prioritization, funding criteria, public trust
  - Public ADV reporting- NCWRC website
- Current Database WRC
  - Limited access, keeping it updated
- Authority
  - NCWRC: investigation, owner notification,
     waiting period, legal review (60-120 days)
    - Stickering, Certified Letter
  - Local jurisdictions and vessel ordinances
- Removal and Disposal
  - Coordination with regulatory agencies
    - Federal funding = NEPA
  - DCM and NOAA's Best Management Practices
  - Landfill cooperation







# **ADV Removals**









North Carolina Coastal Federation Working Together for a Healthy Coast

### **ADV Disposal**

- Dependent on ADV condition, contractor, project timing/deadline
- Metal can be recycled, takes time, build into contract
- Landfill restrictions, fees
- Need lay down yard/break down sites
- Follow BMPs at haul out and demo sites








# **Abandoned and Derelict Vessels (ADVs)**

#### **ADVs Removed since 2020**

- NC WRC ~ 200 ADVs
- NCCF 106 ADVs\*
- DCM 2 ADVs
- Local Governments ~40
   ADVs
- TOTAL ~ 350 ADVs
   Removed
- \*106 ADVs totaling 469.3 tons or 938,600lbs
- \* Removal costs: \$3,500 \$90,000 (~\$450/lf)
- \*Ranged in weight from 450 lbs. to 145,000 lbs.

## **Challenges and Lessons Learned**

- Length of time from assessment to removal
- Contacting owners, ownership transfers, no bill of sale
- Vessel "dumping" owners and/or marina operators
- Limited resources for enforcement, penalties
- Moving vessels between jurisdictions to avoid penalties and/or enforcement
- Shared, accessible vessel database
- Coordination with multiple local governments, agencies, military
- Dedicated ADV mooring or storage areas; regional haul out and demo yards







# 2019 NCWRC Commissioned ADV Study and Final Report Recommendations

- ADV Task Force: Set up taskforce to establish and maintain statewide ADV program
- Legislative Changes:
  - Clear authorities for ADV identification, notification, tracking, removal, and disposal
  - Designation of a lead state agency
- <u>Funding:</u> State agencies and local governments utilize/leverage federal funding sources to supplement state funding sources
- Outreach/Prevention: Implement a prevention program targeted to vessel owners, marine contractors, local governments, law enforcement and the general public
- Voluntary Measures: Vessel turn-in program







# **Final Thoughts**

- Establish, maintain and fund a permanent, state level, ADV prevention and removal program that will:
- Utilize and capitalize public/private partnerships
- Support local government ADV programs
- Lay the groundwork for a proactive and storm ready program
- Incorporate voluntary measures, incentives along with fees, insurance requirements, penalties and fines
- Capitalize on public/private partnerships to support the program:
- Work directly with state agencies to secure and leverage federal dollars, and to work expeditiously and efficiently with contractors to remove vessels
- Generate support and guide legislative changes and appropriations to give agencies and local governments the authority and resources to deal with the

problem of ADVs.











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
